Tessellating tiles

Have fun making a shape. Use it to create your own unique pattern.

You will need: A square piece of card (4cm by 4cm), scissors, tape, paper and colouring pencils.

A **tessellation** is where shapes fit together to make patterns, without overlapping or leaving gaps. An artist called M.C. Escher was famously good at these.





There are lots more examples <u>HERE</u>. Today, you are going to create your own **tessellating pattern**!

First make your tile...

• Draw a shape on the left-hand side of your card square, so that one side is part or all of the side of the card.

E.g. like this...



or this.



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 Now slide the cut-out piece across to the right-hand side at exactly the same height. Tape it in place. You have made your 'tile'!





Then make your design...

- Draw carefully around your tile.
- Slide it across, making sure you don't overlap or leave a gap. Draw around it again.
- Repeat this until you have a row of outlines.
- Now repeat with another row underneath.

Now colour your pattern!

- How you do this is up to you!
- It can be quite effective to use alternate colours, but the choice is yours!



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Challenge!

• If you enjoyed making tessellations, explore fitting these squares and triangles together... Can you make a tessellating pattern?
